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UP TO 15 OFFICERS COULD GO TO LAW SCHOOL AT ARMY EXPENSE UNDER FUNDED LEGAL PROGRAM

As many as 15 active duty commissioned officers will be given the opportunity to law school at government expense under this year's iteration of the Army's Funded Legal Education Program.

Under the program, elected officers will remain on active duty while attending law school, beginning in the fall of 2005.

The FLEP program is open to commissioned officers in the grades of second lieutenant through captain. The Army Office of The Judge Advocate General will accept applications for this year's program from August 1 through November 1. Applicants must have at least two but not more than six years of total active federal service at the time legal training begins. Eligibility is governed by United States Code 10, 2004, and cannot be waived. To determine their eligibility, interested officers should review Chapter 14 of Army Regulation 27-1, (Judge Advocate Legal Services), which is dedicated to outlining the program.

Eligible officers interested in applying should also immediately register for the earliest offering of the Law School Admission Test.
